



The Opening Ceremony

In the Opening Ceremony of this year's ACGMUN, we were happy to enjoy a variety of speeches and songs as well as a short play. Firstly, Lefteris Staikos, Secretary General, introduced this year's theme, which is "Digital Citizenship" and reminded the participants that in the 3rd ACGMUN we are going green, and highlighted the importance of everybody's contribution.

The principal of our school, Mr. Eric Trujillo, after thanking the people involved with the organization of this conference, talked about the significance of digital citizenship, issues of privacy and cryptocurrency.

The next speaker, Kostas Loukas, the General Manager of Public Sector at Microsoft Central and Eastern Europe, made clear that the world is constantly changing. He invited everyone to consider the ideas presented and further urged delegates to pose questions. He referred to a quote by Albert Einstein; "The world is a dangerous place to live, not because of the people who are evil, but because of the people who don't anything about it" and encouraged the young people of today to make the right ethical decisions.

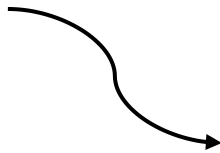
